





Climate and Environment

- Four distinct seasons each year
- The weather in Saskatchewan is generally dry and sunny.
- Summer daytime temperatures range from 20°C to 25°C (68 F to 100 F). Evenings are cool, requiring a light sweater or jacket.
- Average annual rainfall of 363.9 mm ensures lush garden, parks, and golf courses.
- Winter temperatures vary from +5°C to -30°C (40 F to -35 F).
- In winter, snowfall is sufficient to encourage many winter sports.



Where will your days off take you? The Trans-Canada Highway between Victoria, BC and St. John's (NF) is one of the Longest National Highways in the world with a length of 7,476 km.



Saskatchewan is blessed with seasonal changes that bring bright, white snow. Snow and winter activities are a highlight of the Canadian lifestyle and something everyone in the world should have the opportunity to experience.



Camping

More than twelve percent of Saskatchewan is covered by lakes and rivers. Over 100,000 of the lakes and rivers are in the northern half of the province in the Canadian Shield.

Two larger freshwater lakes are found in Saskatchewan – Lake Athabasca and Reindeer Lake. Part of Lake Athabasca is in Alberta, and a small part of Reindeer Lake is in Manitoba. Other large lakes in Saskatchewan are Wollaston Lake, Cree Lake and Lac La Ronge.

Lake Diefenbaker is a large body of water that was formed in 1967 when Gardiner Dam was built on the South Saskatchewan River.

All drivers are required to apply for a SIN. You will require a SIN to work in Canada or to receive government benefits. You will be asked to present your work permit and passport when you apply for your SIN. Also, you should take a copy of your employment contract as proof of employment.

New Homes from \$300,000.00 Canadian

- CMHC (Canada Mortgage and Housing Association) has instituted a new policy to make it possible for Non-Permanent Residents holding a valid Canadian Employment Authorization Form (Work permit) to purchase a home.
- Homes to purchase can be viewed at realtor.ca, select Saskatchewan from the map and follow the links to the Saskatoon area.

Borrower Qualifications:

- Non-permanent residents of Canada
- Must have valid work permit or a letter from a current employer confirming customer is legally eligible for work in Canada
- Principal residence in country of origin does not have to be sold
- Must have no derogatory credit history
- Not available to Diplomats or any other political appointed individuals who do not pay income tax in Canada
- GNW Insured: application must be within 24 months of arrival and a minimum of 3 months full time employment in Canada is required.

Required Documentation

- Must have a valid work permit or a letter from the current Canadian employer confirming customer is legally eligible for work in Canada
- Must also provide any one of the following as a personal reference
 - ✓ A written reference from a current employer
 - ✓ A reference from a recognized Canadian financial institution
 - ✓ An international Credit Bureau report (borrower must provide complete address from their country of origin for this purpose.

Down Payment

- Uninsured: Minimum 35% from own resources; no gifted down payments
- Insured by CMHC: Minimum 10% from own resources; gifted funds in addition to the minimum from own resources are acceptable
- Insured GNW: Minimum 5% from own resources: for LVRs 85: or less, up to 10% can be a gift from a nonoccupying guarantor



If you are planning on purchasing accommodations, you should contact a real estate agent a minimum of 2 weeks prior to your arrival regarding your accommodation needs.

MELT (Mandatory Entry-Level Training) Program

- Nominations issued for NOC 7511- Transport Truck Drivers will be conditional until proof of MELT training and valid Class 1 A License if provided to SINP.
 - · Melt training is done while living in Saskatchewan
- 2. Approximately \$10,000 \$12,000 (ten to twelve thousand dollars) CAD for MELT Training
 - You are responsible for all costs associated with successfully completing the MELT Training while living in SK. You will not be compensated by the employer while you take the MELT Training.
- 3. Mandatory training requirements for drivers who want to be license to drive semi truck took effect March 15, 2019
 - This change was announced to make Saskatchewan roads safer for commercial semi truck drivers and everyone who shares the road with them.

MELT (Mandatory Entry-Level Training) Program

Training Requirements

- 1. The new standards require drivers seeking a Class 1 commercial license to take a minimum 121.5 hours of training
- 2. That includes a minimum of 47 classroom hours, 17.5 hours in the yard and 57 hours behind the wheel.
 - · Training will focus on priority curriculum areas:
 - ✓ Basic driving techniques
 - ✓ Professional driving habits
 - √ Vehicle inspections
 - ✓ Air breaks





MELT (Mandatory Entry-Level Training) Program

You can register for the training one of two ways – on your own or through a commercial driver training school.

- 1. On your own

- 2. Through a training school
 - Some schools offer online training as part of a full MELT package that includes the in-yard and in-cab training.

 - SGI certifies all Saskatchewan driver training schools for driver's licence training



Obtaining your Class 1A drivers license will begin on your intake date in Saskatoon, SK.

- \$ 25.00 to Validate License (\$15 to upgrade to Class 1 A if you already have a Saskatchewan Class 5 License)

Do not switch your current license to Canadian before you arrive. Doing so will cancel your license, which is needed to obtain your Canadian Class 1A.

We will provide you with a Company Orientation (training) that outlines the policies and procedures specific to the Company you have chosen to work for.

The Company Orientation (training) will be 2 or 3 days depending on the size of the class and number of questions. Lunch will be provided.

You will study safety training in Dangerous Goods and complete the required administrative paperwork.

The Company Orientation (training) will take place in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan

8.0 Commonly Asked Questions

We have received many questions regarding the process of immigrating to Canada. To help everyone, here are the most commonly asked questions.

1. Work Permit

How much is the cost of application for my family and me?

- Work Permit \$ 155.00 CDN
- Study Permit \$ 150.00 CDN
- Visitor Permit \$ 100.00 CDN

Fees can be paid online at https://www.cic.gc.ca/english/information/fees/index.asp.

2. Arrival Dates

a. When should I arrive in Canada?

Your company representative will work with you to coordinate arrival dates.

3. Flights

a. Which Port of Entry will I be arriving at?

The first airport in Canada with international landing.

b. Can my family travel with me on the same flight?

Yes

c. How are the flights booked?

It is your responsibility to book your flights. Your company representative will work with you to coordinate arrival dates.

4. Personal Belongings / Property

a. Should we bring our household goods?

This is your decision. You may find it easier to sell as much as you can and purchase your furniture and other belongings in Canada. It can be quite costly to transport goods.

b. What work clothing / equipment will I require?

Our Company does not require uniforms but we do have a professional appearance policy. We will review the policy at your orientation.

Steel toed boots are required, if you do not already have a pair, these can be purchased in Canada.

5. Accommodations

a. Upon arrival, where do we stay?

A hotel room, bed & breakfast, or rental property. It may be best to arrange a temporary accommodation such as a hotel, bed and breakfast, or rental property until you are able to secure permanent accommodations. Your company representative can assist by making recommendations for hotels, bed and breakfasts, etc.

b. Who pays for the accommodations?

It is your responsibility to book and pay for your, and your family's accommodations.

c. Are there pet friendly hotels / motels?

Yes, there are pet friendly hotels/motels. Please contact the hotel regarding their policies and extra charges for pets.

6. What are the best areas to search for a home? Are there areas I should avoid?

We recommend you use a realtor. However, you are not obligated to use their services.

7. Medical Insurance

a. Do I have medical insurance?

Yes, you and your family will be covered under Provincial Health Care. However, it could take up to 30 days for your Health Care to be effective.

8. Medical

a. Do you or your family have any medical conditions that may effect your application for permanent residency?

In some cases, medical admissibility is a reason for Permanent Residency not to be granted. This applies to the applicant, the spouse and the children.

Medical conditions that would be considered a cause for concern are those likely be a danger to public safety or might reasonably expected to cause excessive demand on the country. Examples could be Cancer or Tuberculosis.

9. Criminal Records

a. What is the effect of having a criminal record?

Neither the applicant nor their dependents can have a criminal record. Criminal and security admissibility are reasons for permanent residency not to be granted.

10. Drivers License

a. Is my Car License valid in Saskatchewan?

In most cases your car license will be valid in Saskatchewan for up to 90 days. Spouses may transfer their car license into a Saskatchewan Class 5 car license within the 90-day period for there to be no testing required.

Note: Do not change your Driver's License to Saskatchewan as this will cancel your current Class 1, which you will need to obtain your Class 1A license.

b. How do I obtain my Class 1A license?

Transport Truck Drivers require MELT training to obtain a commercial Class 1 License. You are responsible for all costs associated with successfully completing the MELT training. You will not be compensated by the Employer when you take the MELT training.

- MELT approximately \$ 10,000 12,000 (ten to twelve thousand dollars Canadian)
- \$ 25.00 each sitting for 7 Computerized Multiple Choice Theory Exams

Signs: recognize highway signs & understand their meaning

Class 5: cars, vans and 2 axle trucks

Class 4: taxis, ambulances and buses having a seating capacity of 16 - 24 passengers

Class 3: trucks with more than 2 axles

Class 2: buses having a seating capacity in excess of 24 passengers

Class 1: power units and semi-trailers and trucks

Air: understand how the air brake system works - different parts of the system and what they do

- \$ 25.00 to retake any unsuccessful test
- \$ 155.00 for 3 practical exams

\$55.00 - Airbrake & Pre-Trip

\$ 100.00 - Road Test

\$ 25.00 to Validate License (\$ 15.00 to upgrade from local Class 5)

After successful completion you will receive your Saskatchewan 1A license.

c. What is the percentage of drivers passing their Road Test?

90% of drivers have passed their Road Test on their first try.

11. Partners / Spouses / Family

a. Can my partner/spouse work the 1st year while in Canada?

Through the Federal Temporary Foreign Worker LMIA program. Your spouse is unable to work until you receive your provincial nomination. Then they are able to apply for an open work permit.

Through the province SINP program, your spouse is eligible for an open work permit when you, the principal migrant, is nominated. It is always best to verify when you arrive at the port of entry.

b. Can my family come to Canada?

Yes, through the PNP you can bring your immediate family (spouse/children) to Canada. They can also become permanent residents.

12. Education

a. Do my children need a Study Permit?

Spouses/partners must have a Study Permit if they wish to take a course that is longer than 6 months. For more information on who requires a study permit please visit: http://www.canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-citizenship/services/study-canada/study-

permit/eligibility.html

b. How do I enrol my children (child) in school?

You should have the most current report card or transcript for each child. You are encouraged to contact the school of your choice and speak with the principal as soon as possible. The principal will be able to answer any questions you may have.

c. Am I responsible for purchasing school supplies for my children (child)?

Yes, it is the parent's responsibility to purchase school supplies for their children. Examples of school supplies that may be required are:

Pencils	Ruler	Pens	Glue	Binders	Calculator
Erasers	Markers	Crayons	Geometry Set	White Out	Gym Shoes

Please contact the school for an accurate list of supplies required.

d. Are there fees for College and University?

Yes, there are tuition and book fees for both college and university. Fees will vary depending on the post-secondary institution and course.

13. Pets

a. Can we bring our pets to Canada?

Dogs may enter Canada if accompanied by a certificate from a veterinarian of the country of origin that clearly identifies the animals and shows that:

- ✓ Rabies has not existed in that country for six months immediately preceding shipment of the animals and
- ✓ The animals have been in that country for the six-month period referred to in paragraph above or since birth.

Please check with Canadian Customs prior to arriving and travelling with your pet.

b. Do we have to license our pets?

Yes, you have to license your pet in Saskatchewan. Please contact City Hall to obtain a pet license.

14. Banks

a. How does the banking work?

If required, we can assist by making an appointment for you at a local bank.

15. Government Deductions

Income Tax: If earning a salary of \$60,000 - \$70,000, you can expect to pay up to approximately 25% - 30% in income tax and Government Deductions.

Other Government Deductions include Canada Pension Plan (CPP) and Employment Insurance (EI).

16. Port of Entry

a. What happens at the Port of Entry?

Present your papers to the Customs Officer

- ✓ Passport
- ✓ Letter from the High Commission if arriving through the Temporary Foreign Worker LMIA program
- ✓ SINP Nomination Certificate/Support Letter if arriving through the Provincial SINP
- ✓ Certificate of Veterinarian if bringing a pet

17. Passports

Before coming to Canada please make sure that you and all your family members have at least 4 years on your passport before it expires.

18. Applying for Permanent Landed Immigrant Status

a. Is there any documentation I should prepare to bring with me?

You will be required to provide copies of Identity and Civil Status Documents. This includes:

- ✓ Copy of SINP Nomination Certificate
- ✓ Police Clearance: for applicant and spouse
- ✓ Birth Certificate: spouse and dependents if applicable
- ✓ Marriage Certificate: if applicable
- ✓ Divorce Certificate: if applicable
- ✓ Custody and maintenance documents: if applicable
- ✓ Passports spouse and dependents: if applicable
- ✓ Three employment verification letters on official Company letterhead
- ✓ English Language Testing Assessment: applicant

Applicants, spouses and dependents will also be asked to give the details of activities during the last 10 years or since age 18 whichever period is longer. This includes all activities such as jobs held, periods of unemployment, schooling, travel, addresses, etc.

19. English Language Testing

- English Language testing is mandatory. The testing is directed towards your reading, writing, listening and speaking skills.
- A language score of at least Canadian Language Benchmark 4 is required.
- Proof of completion and a passing grade must be submitted as part of your Provincial Nomination Application.
- You must complete the exam in your home country prior to arriving in Canada.
- Keep your receipt. The Company will reimburse you for the cost of the exam.
- The following two exams are recognized:

✓ IELTS (International English language Testing System)

The cost of the exam is \$329.00 CAD

The passing grade is a 4 overall

✓ CELPIP (Canadian English Language Proficiency Index Program)

The cost of the exam is \$ 280.00 CAD plus taxes

The passing grade is 4

Driving along at 60mph in the distance, I saw something moving in the grass at the side of the road. When I got close enough to see what it was, I saw a wild boar! Having just had the Christmas period off after my training trip, I decided to start on the road on New Years Day. Larry and his staff at Edge Garage worked hard and quickly to ensure that my truck was ready for the road. So it was into the yard, strap the load and away I went. My first trip was to Hartley in Iowa. I knew from the weather channel on TV that the 16 south from Saskatoon to Winnipeg was closed off at Yorkton, due to heavy snow, so plan B was now in place. I went to Regina, however by the time I reached the Brandon area, the road was closed off there as well. That's Canadian weather for you.

The road re-opened at noon the next day and off I went again. I managed to make up the lost time and got to the delivery on time. Due to it now only being 3rd January and most companies still closed, I went about 5 hours to Davenport, Iowa for my back-load. This I picked up and then delivered to Regina. I then got a load from Regina to a small village about 100 miles away. Not wanting a load back to the Saskatoon area, the dispatch office got me a load from Winnipeg to Dallas, Texas. This went well and it was down to Houston, Texas for my back-load. This was for delivery in Edmonton, Alberta. The route brought me back via Saskatoon, so I took advantage and went home for the night. When I went into the yard the next morning to carry on my journey, my truck needed to go into the garage for a couple of minor jobs, so another driver took my load onto Edmonton. This now gave me a few days off.

I got a call from Darwin, my truck was fully mobile and ready to go again. My load was picking up in Saskatoon and then delivering to Palmdale, California (near Los Angeles). I went via Las Vegas, what a place that is. The delivery went well and then I went about 30 minutes for my back load, which was for High River, Alberta (just south of Calgary). Going great guns now and the job really couldn't get any better. I made contact with Darwin in Dispatch and asked him to spin me and send me south again. This wasn't any problem and then I went to Lethbridge, Alberta for another load. This time I went to a small village south of San Francisco, California. Once again there was no problems with the delivery and it was back over the mountain, just over the state line into Nevada, (near Reno) for my back load. Couldn't have asked for a better load. It was a delivery on 50th street, Saskatoon. Nice. Had a couple days off at home and then loaded around the corner from the yard for Waterloo, lowa.

Another good run south and I picked up my back load about 5 miles away. This was two deliveries, the first in Edmonton and the second in Calgary, Alberta (via Saskatoon). So it was home for the night again on

route. Got both deliveries off and then got my next load south about 30 minutes from Calgary. This was for a delivery in Three Forks, Montana. Yes, again no problems and all went well with that one. I then went 16 miles down the road for my back load, which was for Saskatoon.

I arrived back in Saskatoon on Saturday, 12th February and with the load now parked up in the Edge Yard, I will go in on Monday morning to deliver it.

<u>CUSTOMS/BROKER</u>. This couldn't be easier. It's just a matter of faxing the paperwork to the Broker at the border and they do the rest.

<u>DISPATCH (PLANNERS)</u>. Once you get your load details, which includes everything you need, i.e.; Fax/Tel numbers etc., you do the rest. What a massive difference to the planning schedule back in the UK/Euro. You phone the Shipper to collect and then the Consignee to organize your delivery, date and time. Life just couldn't be made simpler.

<u>LOADING/DELIVERING</u>. Every Load and Delivery I have done in the past 6 weeks have been a pleasure and I can honestly say the UK/Euro need to take a leaf from the Canadian/USA book for HAULAGE. The Shipper and Consignee are always pleased to see you and I have never been delayed in collecting or delivering.

ROADS/TRUCKING. Yes, the roads are straight and long, but what a bonus!!! We get paid by the mile. The longest traffic jam I have been in so far is around 20 minutes going through Minneapolis and that was the Tea Time Traffic. The trucks are serviced every 24,000 KM (UK: 35,000). That says it all. The other truckers on the road have a lot of respect for each other and are very serious on safety. That certainly suits me!

CONCLUSION. From arriving and completing the Company training program to now having been on the road for the past 6 weeks, I have never looked back and only wish I had made the move a lot sooner. The people are so polite and pleasant, sometimes I wonder if this is a dream. The place (Saskatoon), is a lovely small city and the local community take great pride in it.

The first five months I ran the states and every trip was an adventure. Sometimes a little nerve- racking, but I soon learned the dos and don'ts. The actual driving (I think most Brits will agree) is very easy. With the wide-open roads and very little congestion, easier than Trans European work.

Border-crossings the world over are the same. Paperwork must be right – No excuses. As long as you stick with that, you're OK. ETA's must be written on the paperwork. A good tip would be to make your ETA a few hours earlier than when you will actually arrive at the border. It will definitely have cleared by then.

I went back to England for a month and packed my house up and sold it a month later. A month after that, I came back with my girlfriend and her daughter. All was a little rushed.

Now it's May 2^{nd} – a year to the day I stepped off the plan. I have bought a house in Saskatoon and at last I can settle down in and enjoy all that Canada has to offer.

Gary, United Kingdom (arrived May 2, 2005); Harv Wilkening Transport Ltd. I arrived in Saskatoon on the 10th of November. I spent three nights in a hotel and them moved into lodging. I'm very comfortable there; it's like a home away from home.

I started training on Monday. I wasn't sure about the gear box on the truck; it's a lot different to what I was used to but Paul Sharpe the Trainer helped me get through it and I passed my test on Saturday.

Since arriving here in Saskatoon, the people in the area are very friendly and helpful as well as the staff at Siemens and the dispatchers in Kindersley Transport.
